## **Club and Group News**

## Days Out

#### Churches 27

<u>The Anglican Church of St. George's</u> was founded in the 13th century in the village of Wembdon. The current building dates from the 14th and 15th century but was largely rebuilt in 1868 after a large fire. Unfortunatley the certificate for fire insurance had expired, so had to be rebuilt with significant local aid.

The church was granted by William Testard, lord of Wembdon Manor to St. John's Hospital Bridgwater in 1284.

Wembdon is first mentioned in the Domesday Book, although there is considerable evidence of Roman and Saxon habitation. Before the fire of 1867 the building was originally rendered in white plaster as were many churches in the area (see Stogursey). The tower survives today complete; the rest of the building was heavily altered in its restoration minus the white plaster.

<u>St. Mary's Church Cannington</u> - the village itself sits astride Cannington Brook, a tributary of the River Parret. The manor of Cannington was held by the crown at the time of King Alfred the Great, and it was still a royal manor at the time of the Norman Conquest in 1066. We know there was a church in Cannington at the time of the Domesday Book. We know almost nothing of the Saxon church, but we do know that in 1138 the church was given by Robert de Curci of Stogursey as part of his endowment of Cannington Priory.

The oldest part of the present church is the west tower, built in the 14th century. It contains 6 bells - the earliest two were cast by George Purdue of Taunton in 1619. The third cast in 1766 by Thomas Bayley of Bridgwater. The other three were cast in 1893 by Llewellings and James of Bristol. The last restoration of the bells took place in 1900, by Taylor and Co, of Loughborough. During the church restoration it was done in the Perpendicular Gothic style. Perhaps the best historical highlight is the wagon roof decorated with original medieval carved and painted bosses. There are 131 bosses in the nave and chancel combined.

At the base of the pulpit steps is the grave of the Child of Cannington, the "child" was apparently a young woman thought to be a princess or perhaps an early Christian saint. In 1975 the child was reinterred in the church and a wooden statue carved by a local sculptor; she was thought to be about 16 years of age when she died.

Over the South door is a gilded and painted royal coat of arms to King Charles 2nd. On the wall is a plaque commemorating the Officers and Men or the 535th Anti-aircraft Battalion of the US Army who were stationed at Cannington prior to the D-Day landings at Utah Beach in Normandy.

St. Mary's is a beautiful historical building full of interest, well worth a visit.

<u>Stogursey</u> is a picturesque village on the fringe of the Quantock Hills. The village really began to develop after the Norman Conquest, and several decades after the coming of the Normans, the church of St. Andrew was built; it was certainly in existence before 1100AD. In the first few years of the 12th century the church was given by William de Falaise to the Priory at Lonlay in Normandy. The Norman priory sent monks to Somerset and by 1120 a small monastic community had been established. The Priory shared the use of the church with the villagers; it became known as Stoke Courci Priory after William de Courci. Over time the Somerset dialect changed Stoke Courci to Stogursey. Nothing remains of it today it suffered at the hands of King Henry V who in 1414 seized all alien priories. The priory was dissolved around 1440 and it became a parish church.

It was further altered in the 15th century and the nave was extensively restored in 1824. At floor level in the South arch is a Sanctuary Ring installed in the 13th century. In medieval England criminals could find a Place of Refuge in a church for up to forty days and then admit their crime or stand trial. If they admitted their felony they would forfeit their possessions and go into exile. The sanctuary ring was installed in 1243 after a murderer John de Rechich was granted sanctuary and then absconded before his trial which meant that the priory was liable for his fine.

St. Andrew's is a delightful church full of historical interest.

started from Withy Grove this time, by way of a change. I gave in after a short distance but the stalwart six kept going nearly to Woolavington Level when they were thwarted




by a very muddy patch. We had hoped to get a hot drink at Country Bumpkins Bistro but they were closed so we returned to Sopha, for sustenance.
