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
Chairman's Message

Our October trip will be to Monmouth via the Wye Valley on Tuesday 22nd October. Cost £19.00 per person.



DAY OUT IN BRIDGWATER AND TAUNTON CANAL

The Bridgwater and Taunton Canal is one of a kind. Cut off from other waterways and skirting the Somerset Levels, the canal offers rural calm and wonderful walks for nature enthusiasts as well as peaceful boating. For cyclists, the well-maintained towpath forms part of the National Cycle Route 3 and the Parrett Way. If you wish you can walk from Bridgwater to Taunton along the 14 mile canal.

Over the centuries, countless ships were wrecked as they sailed around Cornwall's treacherous coastline. In the late 1700AD a scheme was hatched whereby they could trade from the Bristol Channel to the English Channel via inland waterways a fast and safer route. The idea was that the Bridgwater and Taunton Canal would link with a planned network of navigable waterways reaching Exeter on Devon's south coast.

From 1822AD armies of Irish labourers (navvies) were employed under the supervision of engineer James Hollinsworth to dig out the canal. Using pickaxes, shovels and wheelbarrows, the work was hard and the days were long. Apart from cutting the channel, they had to line the bottom and sides with clay, construct the banks and towpath and build the locks, bridges and lock keeper's and lengthmen's cottages. The 12-mile canal with 5 locks was completed in 1827AD, stretching between the River Parrett at Huntworth near Bridgwater and the River Tone at Taunton. In 1838AD the canal was linked to the Grand Western Canal, which reached as far as Tiverton. If you would like a day out you can access the towpath from most bridges that cross it. Our group went to Maunsell Lock near North Newton where

there is a centre offering refreshments also the last remaining lock keepers cottage.

There must have been a man from Florida back there because I heard him yelling something about a sunny beach.




