## <u>Cheddar</u>

The Church of St. Andrew's in Cheddar dates from the 14th century has been designated a Grade 1 listed building and probably the fourth church to be built on the site of an early Roman settlement. The earliest reference to a church in Cheddar is made in the will of King Alfred (901AD) who left money to the religious families or monastic community in Cheddar. The church was restored in 1873 by William Butterfield. It contains some 15th century stained glass and an altar table of 1631. The chest tomb in the chancel is believed to be to Sir Thomas de Cheddar a wealthy Bristol merchant and is dated 1442. On the floor is a brass plate of his widow Lady Isabel de Cheddar (d1476) dressed in wimple and widow's weeds.

The tower of the church rises to 100 feet and dates from around 1423 and contains eight bells; the tenor which dates from 1759 was cast by Thomas Bilbie of the Bilbie family, bell founders and clockmakers based in Chew Stoke Somerset and later at Collumpton Devon.

## **Draycott**

St.Peter's Church in Draycott is a Grade 2 listed building, designed by Charles Edmund Giles, and consecrated in 1861. The church is a simple Early English revival style; it was built of stone known as "Draycott Marble" quarried nearby. The church holds a notable font by the celebrated Victorian architect William Burges. It is uncertain how the font came to St. Peter's; its size suggests that the original intended site was the church of St. James in Winscombe. In 2006 the church controversially attempted to sell the font to a private collector for £110,000. The vicar at the time said the sale was essential to meet a repair and restoration bill of £170,000. Permission was refused in 2009 by the Church of England's highest court.

#### **Rodney Stoke**

St.Leonard's is a Grade 1 small medieval church situated at the western end of the village. The church was first built in the 12th century and has been added to over the centuries. It has many visitors throughout the year, some of whom come from overseas. The church has some remarkable features inside, most notably are the four monuments to the Rodney family in the chapel built in the 15th century. The pews in the nave have beautiful bench ends originally carved by the villagers. One of the stained glass windows, which has been recently restored, commemorates the safe return of the men and women who took part in the First World War and is known as the Thanksgiving Window.

Rodney Stoke is recorded in the Doomsday Book as Stoches, and in 1291 as Stokgifford after the Giffard or Gifard Family who were lords of the manor. The Giffards were Saxon nobility at the time of Edward the Confessor with Walter Giffard appointed the Earl of Buckingham.


